

The Stanislaus County Agricultural Crop Report for 1998 is hereby submitted in compliance with Section 2279 of the California Food and Agricultural Code.

The gross agricultural income for 1998 is \$1,302,714,000. This decrease of approximately \$14,228,000 from 1997 is mainly due to losses in Fruit and Nut, and Field Crops. However, gains were posted in Vegetable Crops, Livestock and Poultry, and Nursery Products. Advancing commodities include Apricots, Silage, Tomatoes, Chickens, Milk and Eggs. Declining items are Almonds, Grapes, Peaches, Walnuts, Dry Beans, Grain Hay and Sweet Potatoes.

It must be noted that these are gross figures and do not indicate net profit. Please note that some totals may not add due to rounding. Also, figures shown do not reflect on any individual operation since the whole county is the smallest unit measured for any particular commodity.

We wish to express our gratitude to the many persons who contributed to the preparation of this document. Sincere appreciation is due to the staff of the Agricultural Commissioner and the U.C. Cooperative Extension. Special thanks go to the following individuals: Emilio Gonzalez, who gathered and refined the data from many sources and compiled this report; Stacy Fields, who did the typing and set-up; and Cynthia Darmstandler, who provided oversight throughout and coordinated the publication process.


